Panther time will occur around the middle school lunch time and will address parts of the curriculum not covered in core academic classes. Social Emotional learning, career exploration, team building, and goal setting will all be addressed during this time, along with academic interventions for students who are not at grade level in Reading and Mathematics. During panther time, Tri-County North Middle School will also be participating on a "one-book, one school" initiative where all students in the middle school will be reading the same book and be treated with an author visit at the end of the school year.

During the past year and a half, I have heard numerous times the statement "I just want things to return to normal." I am not sure what "normal" is, but I do know that I do not want TCNMS to just be "normal." It is my expectation that we are better than normal. As some COVID restrictions are being lifted, we will resume some of the things that we have missed out on in the past year. Our goal is to do these things better than we ever have in the past. I want our communication with families to improve by using new tools such as "parent square" which will be introduced later in the year. I want to appreciate and celebrate the successes that we have more often. I want TCNMS to take what normal is and improve it.

Lastly, I want to take a minute to welcome some new faces to Tri-County North Middle School. Mrs. Shanon Blankenship will be the Middle School Counselor this year and comes to us from Springfield City. Mr. Mitch McCurdy is our new 7th and 8th grade Social Studies teacher, as well as the new boys Varsity Basketball Coach and he comes to us from Xenia Summit Academy. First Lego League

FIRST LEGO League introduces STEM by having students engage in research, problem-solving, coding and engineering. Tri-County North has had teams participate in FIRST for the last 6 years. This year was a bit different as students had to participate in the events virtually. Our students persevered, worked hard, and had a great season! This year the FIRST theme was called RePLAY. Students were challenged to think about how and where we can help people be more active. Teams did a research project and created a model for their innovative solution to this problem. Students also had to build and program a LEGO robot that navigates the missions of a robot game.

The 5th and 6th grade team including Luke Baughman, Ben Knife, Alyssa Arnett, Addie Clearmont, Demi Ditmer, Caitlin Caudill, Peyton Fannin, Luke Wright, and Bailey Quinn, decided to focus on getting young kids to be more active. They came up with the idea of creating a Safari themed, pedal powered roller coaster for the local park to motivate young children to get exercise while having fun. They did research and made a model of their idea. They placed in the top 10 teams for qualifiers and were asked to participate in the state competition. They also got a trophy at the qualifiers for being the team that showed the best Core Values/teamwork!

Kasidi Daugherty, Rylie Myers, and Wyatt Beare, The Motion Motivators, competed on the 8th-grade FLL team this year. Through their research, students learned that the number one reason people do not exercise is because it is boring, so they have no motivation to do it. This sparked their interest, and they decided to brainstorm ways to help get people of all ages more interested in exercising. The students created Motivate to Move, a board game that helps make physical activity fun! The Motion Motivators also ranked in the top 10 at their qualifying event and competed at the Ohio State Championship competition.

History Day Competition

Tri-County North's high school students were given the opportunity to take a history day class this year. History Day gives students the skills needed to be successful in college. Students learn how to delve deeply into research, examine primary and secondary sources, write analytically, design an exhibit, and use their voices to explain their understanding of a topic. Even though the competition was virtual this year, students were still provided the opportunity to discuss their projects with the History Day coordinators, contact people who lived through the events they studied, and take part in interviews. These experiences will stay with the students and help them in the future.

Each year, over half a million students participate in History Day worldwide and less than one percent of those students make it to Nationals. The top two projects in Ohio from each category are picked to compete at the National History Day competition, which usually takes place at the University of Maryland. However, due to the unprecedented times, the competition will be virtual. This year's theme is Communication in History: The Key to Understanding. At the Ohio State History Day competition, Brianna Wagoner placed second in the Senior Individual Exhibit category for her project, Get Out of Prison Free: How the Red Cross Communicated with POWs. Devin Corrington and Parker Williams won the Ohio Digitized Archives Researcher Award. They placed first in the Senior Group Exhibit category for their project, Woodstock: Communicating Peace and Love at a Time of Political and Social Unrest. Lillian Toth and Colten Vanwinkle placed second in the Senior Group Exhibit category for their project, Communicating in Secret: The Culper Spy Ring. Everyone from TCN's high school History Day class moved on to the National History Day competition in June. Congratulations to all of you!
