I would like to thank the Tri-County North Community for supporting the renewal of our existing permanent improvement levy this past November. The funds collected from this levy supports projects that allow us to upgrade and maintain our facilities. This summer we focused on several outdoor projects that have really added to the appearance of our school. Two of these projects were the resealing and restriping of our asphalt parking lots and the replacement of the cracked and broken sidewalks that were in front of our school.

The new sidewalk and main entrance project that we had been working on most of the summer has turned out to be a very nice addition. Each engraved brick in the original sidewalk has been replaced and the new courtyard area with limestone top benches provide plenty of room for our students as they wait on parent pickup. On November 11th, TCN honored all Veterans for their service to our country with a Veterans Day Program. The program saluted all branches of the military. The Preble County Honor Guard performed the 21 Gun Salute and Ron Duncan and Kyrstin Haney performed Taps to close out the program. On Thursday, March 2nd, the elementary will be hosting a Family Fun Night. At this event we will be focusing on both math and literacy. To go along with our school theme, Your Passport to Discovery, we will have the Newport Aquarium coming in to do a presentation involving different sea creatures from around the world. This event will be educational and fun. Please mark your calendars to spend the evening with us for a meal and family fun.

Reading is so critical to our children's ability to do well in school for years to come. I want to provide parents, grandparents, and guardians some information on reading. A great foundation of reading can be built at home as well as at school. As students enter kindergarten, they are on different levels of understanding letters, sounds, words, etc. Kindergarten teachers will start with students in their classrooms with as much as five year's difference in reading levels. Some kindergarten students may be able to read and write at the second grade level, while others may not recognize but a few letters and not understand that letters have sounds. This difference in the reading levels has been made up in a large part due to the amount of reading a student has heard prior to entering school and once in school. Students who've been read to 20 minutes a day have working vocabularies of 40,000 words before entering kindergarten. They have heard over 3 million words. Children who've been barely read to or none at all have 10,000 word vocabularies. They've heard just 750,000 words. So if you haven't read to your child prior to entering kindergarten doesn't mean that you failed and are at the point of no return. What this means is it is critically important to start reading to your child to help improve their reading skills no matter from a newborn to 4th grade.



Tips for helping your child improve their reading confidence are: 1) Don't push your child. When reading with your child, don't force him to read. Instead make sure that you are next to each other and he/she is following along with you as you read. Trace your finger along the text as you read. 2) Give him/her privacy. Give them time alone to read without an audience. Respect his/her privacy to read alone. 3) Read to a different audience. Suggest that he/she read to a puppy, younger sibling, or stuffed animal. None of these judge or know if a word was read correctly or not. This helps your child build his/her confidence. A child can build so much confidence by reading to his/her baby brother or sister. Everyone wins! 4) Let your child see you struggle with words. I understand that some parents want to seem infallible, but showing your children that sometimes we have to work hard on a word or two is beneficial too. A parent struggling shows that sounding out words while reading isn't a sign of weakness but a tool to use no matter how good of a reader you are. 5) Don't overcorrect. When your child is reading, do not correct him/her too much. Remember, the goal here is to build confidence. You will have lots of time to work on accuracy and fluency, but take it one step at a time. If your child asks for help with a word go for it, but small mistakes or omissions should be overlooked in the name of confidence for now. The commitment you make now to your child will have a lifelong effect, please take time to read to your child.

The school year is well underway with the first semester completed. I would like to share a few of my thoughts with you about our school and the great things occurring here. We truly have a lot to be thankful for and proud of.

We have a great staff at Tri-County North. I have been impressed by how caring our staff is for our students. On numerous occasions, I have heard students compliment our teachers', letting me know how much a teacher cares. Through classroom observations, I have seen teachers design engaging lessons and connect with our students. Students meet every Friday morning to learn about leadership and develop plans to put their leadership skills into action. Our coaches are working on improving the athletic skills of our student-athletes. In addition, this spring we will have a Spring musical for the first time in many years because of the interest and passion for this activity displayed by our students.

This fall, our district has been very busy with our professional development offerings. We are very proud to have been able to offer our Thoughtful Thursday's. An average of 10 teachers voluntarily stayed for the after school sessions to work on curriculum, instructional improvement and assessment literacy. Our teachers were able to work with English Language Arts and Mathematics consultants to better improve our instructional program. We are very proud of the teachers who spent over 8 hours to better improve the instruction here at TCN. As a whole district, our teachers have also participated in Mental Health First Aid and have been certified after 8 hours of training this past fall. This training was sponsored by the Sandy Hook Promise Foundation. We are very grateful to have had this opportunity to bring this training to our staff.

Additionally, we are proud to be able to highlight two of our teachers who were selected to be presenters at local and national conferences. Mr. Tim Lewis, 6-12 STEM teacher, presented at the 3rd annual WRIGHT symposium, held at the Dayton Regional STEM School in Dayton. Mr. Lewis' presentation discussed how he has made the transition from a traditional classroom teacher to STEM in rural, public school. Our STEM program including Full Throttle and our First Lego Leagues is beginning to develop a positive reputation in the Miami Valley and we are very excited to continue to help it grow and serve our students who wish to excel in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math!

Lastly, we are very excited to see one of our newest members of our faculty, Ms. Elly Shellhaas, 11-12 English Language Arts teacher, be selected to present at the National Council of Teachers of English—Assembly on Literature for Adolescents. The national conference “promotes communication and cooperation among all individuals who have an interest in adolescent literature, presents programs and conferences on this subject.” (www.alan-ya.org) Ms. Shellhaas has been an enthusiastic new member to our 6-12 faculty and we look forward to her continuing to demonstrate her passion for literature and reading with our upperclassman.

The Tri-County North 2017-2018 Kindergarten Registration will be coordinated with other schools in our county and in conjunction with Early Literacy Week.

TCN will hold open kindergarten registration for next year's kindergarteners from **Monday, April 10–Friday, April 14, 2017**. On **Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday**, registration will be from **9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in the District Office**. On **Thursday**, registration will be from **3:30-6:30 p.m. in the District Office**. Simply choose a day and stop in to register your child between that time frame, no appointment needed. 2017-2018 Kindergarteners must be five years old on or before August 1, 2017, and parents must provide the following:

1. Original Birth Certificate (NOT birth record from the hospital)
2. Physician's Immunization Records
3. Original copies of any child custody order, decrees or modifications of order relevant to the child
4. THREE current forms of proof of residency (please refer to www.tcnschools.com for acceptable forms of proof)

Kindergarten screening will be held in August in the Elementary building and will be discussed at registration.

Technology & Curriculum Updates

This fall, TCN was able to take a fairly large step in supporting our students as they move into the blended learning environment that is necessary as we support our 21st century learners. After consultation with our faculty, technology committee and our administrative team, our district was able to purchase 235 Chromebooks for use in our classrooms. This was done using existing funds that were traditionally budgeted for textbooks.

Chromebooks are like a laptop, except they are used solely for online applications. We are very excited to be able to provide our students with additional technology for classroom use. This purchase was made after a yearlong process to move our district to using Google Suites—an online suite of web-based google products that allow our faculty, staff, and students to all use the same web-based email, calendar, and office software. Our students have also been able to take advantage of using google classroom to be able to access online course content and submit work electronically. Our teachers have been able to take advantage of specially designed professional development on using and integrating Google and educational technology for the past year and a half.

This technology upgrade has only been possible because of our continued work in upgrading our facilities. Over the course of this past summer and fall, we have also upgraded our technological infrastructure by installing and adding 20 additional wireless hotspots and upgrading our servers to allow students to have more space for educational applications and to save their work.



Integrating Technology Into Our Curriculum

We are very excited to share out our progress on a curricular pilot that we have been working on with our 1st grade classrooms. This fall, using our federal grant funds, we have purchased an iPad based program called E-Spark. This program provides our first grade students with a personalized set of educational apps on each iPad that are tied to the student's individual district MAP (Measures of Academic Progress district assessment) scores. This personalized and differentiated instruction is showing tremendous gains for our first grade math students. National average improvements in math from fall to winter is typically 11.4 points, our students made an improvement of 20.2 points! That is an 8.8 gain in this area over the national average! Our teachers are very enthusiastic to expand this pilot and are looking forward to adding the reading component in our second semester. Ms. Barbara Kauffman reports that students consistently look forward to E-Spark time and the personalized instruction in skills are very helpful. The proof is in our improvement! We are very grateful to our entire first grade team as they have fully embraced this new technology and have worked well to ensure that we are incorporating this every day into their instruction.



E-Spark has also just released this fall a new tool to address English Language arts standards. This is an additional tool that can help our older students begin to digest non-fiction reading and analysis. This product is called Frontier. As part of our ongoing attempt to provide our students with a blended approach to learning, we are also piloting Frontier in Mrs. Darcy Fitch's 4th grade and Mrs. Stephanie Caudill's 7th grade English Language Arts Classrooms.

This web-based program allows students to choose from real-world problems, research and synthesize the learning they do to complete an authentic solution. Students are exposed to four major questions that allow them to determine: What do they love, what do they wonder, what will they learn, and what will they make? These questions provide students with the ability to choose the topic of research that most interests them. Each topic then provides a curated set of resources that are guided by investigative questions that allow the students to experience first hand the genuine research process.



Current event articles, podcasts, curated videos, and even online games can be a part of the student's experience as they further develop their reading and writing skills to be able to solve real-world problems. Mrs. Stephanie Caudill says, "My students ask me if they can go work on Frontier. We don't get to do as much as I would like." This type of feedback from our students is invaluable as we are providing them with the necessary skills to go out and be able to tackle the challenges of being a learner and leader in the 21st century. As Frontier is also tied to our MAP scores (Measures of Academic Progress district assessment) it also is working well in the fourth grade classroom, being piloted by Mrs. Darcy Fitch. Frontier is able to meet students at the appropriate reading level and provides them with content that matches. Mrs. Fitch finds that this is very helpful as students in fourth grade are just beginning the process of reading to learn and are at varying levels.

Cargill Cares

For the third year in a row, TCN would like to thank our friends at Cargill Incorporated who made a very generous donation to TCN for our Hot Meals Program for our students. The dollars that were donated will allow students who are not on free or reduced lunches, but who might be struggling at the time, to receive a tray lunch in our cafeteria. This provides the opportunity for all of our students to receive a healthy meal. This would not be possible without the donation from Cargill Incorporated.



Cabbage Patch Food Drive

The Christmas spirit is alive and well at TCN. Our district-wide Cabbage Patch food drive was a huge success! We collected enough items to help over 100 families.
