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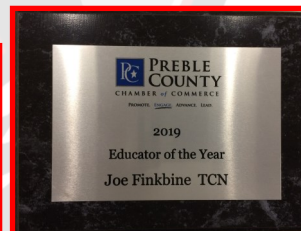
From The Desk Of The Superintendent

In today's day and age, it has become quite easy to hear about all of the negative things that our students do. I can't deny that sometimes our students do things that we wish they hadn't or things that we are not proud of, but as I reflect back on 2019, I would like to share with you several examples of how our students acted in a manner in which any parent would and should be proud of their child. These examples span all grade levels, all ages, and all types of students and they exemplify just how kind and polite many of our students are. I will start with our elementary students and how each year, when they go on their class trip to Wilderness Ridge, (formerly Camp Kern or Woodland Altars), we hear positive comments about how polite and respectful our students have been. Another great example would be our annual Veterans Day Program each year. Even in our own community last year, as the students were participating in community service activities on P.A.W.S Day, I received many compliments on how polite and kind our students were as they were completing their projects. I could go on and on but this newsletter would not be large enough to share with you all of the examples of our students doing good things. So, as I reflect on 2019, these are the things that I would like to focus on..... the positive things that our kids have done! It is easy to go on social media and vent our frustrations about today's youth and how things get handled "wrong" but I would ask in 2020 that we all work together, that we build relationships, and that we focus on the positive things that our students say and do. 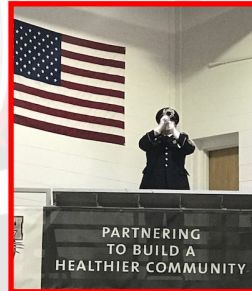

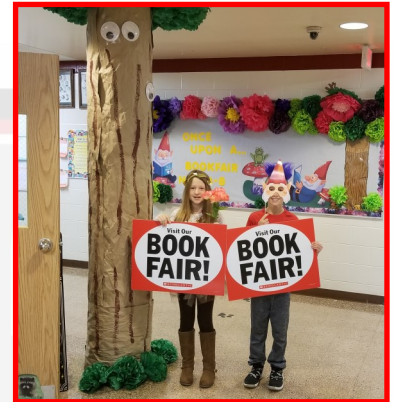

TCN will hold open kindergarten registration in the District Office for next year's kindergarteners from **April 14—April 17, 2020**. Registration times will be as follows:

Tuesday: 1:00 pm—3:00 pm

Wednesday & Friday: 8:00 am—12 noon

Thursday: 3:00 pm—6:00 pm

Simply choose a day and stop in to register your child between that time frame, no appointment needed. 2020-2021 Kindergarteners must be five years old on or before August 1, 2020, and parents must provide the following:

1. Original Birth Certificate from the County Health Department
2. Physician's Immunization Records
3. Original copies of any child custody order, decrees or modifications of order relevant to the child
4. **THREE** current forms of proof of residency (please refer to www.tcnschools.com for acceptable forms of proof)

Kindergarten screening will be held in August in the Elementary building and will be discussed at registration.

FFA News

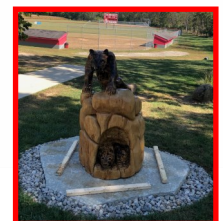
