From The Desk Of The Superintendent

What an excellent fall semester of the 2021-22 school year that is coming to a close! Getting our students back in classrooms, collaborating with each other, cheering each other on, and creating opportunities have been our priorities. I would like to thank our students and teachers for a great first half of the school year and for getting this done.

Tri-County North Local Schools has also made several upgrades over the second half of 2021. New external LED lighting has made the outside of our facilities much brighter and safer for students coming and going in the mornings as well as just walking to their cars after practices and games. The new flashing lights that were installed by the Village at the crosswalks in front of the school have also been a great safety addition this year. Many projects that go unnoticed but are necessary have also been completed over the past summer and fall such as the replacement of several HVAC units as well as repairing the roofing over different classrooms in our building. The previous twelve year old electronic message center in front of the District Office was also replaced this past summer. The "sign" has always been a positive way to communicate upcoming activities and events to our community. Other areas, such as our student activity center (SAC), have also been totally renovated including new paint, new rubber flooring and all new exercise and weight equipment. This coming summer additional projects, such as a new all-weather track and the resurfacing, sanding and painting of our gym floors, are being scheduled for completion. These are just a few examples of upgrades that have taken place over the past several months. As you can see, it has truly been a busy and exciting time for Tri-County North.

We are still dealing with an occasional student or staff member getting Covid-19. When this occurs, we immediately update our Covid-19 dashboard, located on our website, as we want to keep our community as updated and informed as possible. Although we have tried to return to as much "normalcy" as possible, we are still taking precautions by disinfecting desks, door knobs, hand rails and high touch surfaces as well as allowing students and teachers the ability to wear masks if they choose while they are in our school. It has been nice to open things back up and allow many of the events that we have done in years past, such as grandparents day, our annual veterans day program and our senior citizens luncheon. Our kids are also going on fieldtrips, such as our annual 8th grade trip to Washington DC, as well as participating in banquets, concerts, plays and athletic events.

It is hard to believe how fast the first semester of school went this year. I hope that each of you had a happy and enjoyable holiday and that you were able to spend some quality time with your family and friends. We look forward to getting off to a great second semester start as our students return from break. Elementary School News

The elementary school will be hosting, along with the middle school, a Family Literacy Night. We would like to share some of the reasons for the importance of literacy. Literacy is the ability to read and write. As students enter kindergarten they are on different levels of understanding letters, sounds, words, etc. Kindergarten teachers will start with students in their classrooms with as much as a five year's difference in reading levels. Some kindergarten students may be able to read and write at the second grade level, while others may not recognize but a few letters and not understand that letters have sounds. This difference in the reading levels has been made up in a large part due to the amount of reading a student has heard prior to entering school and once in school. Students who've been read to for 20 minutes a day have working vocabularies of 40,000 words before entering kindergarten. They have heard over 3 million words. Children who've been read to barely or none at all have 10,000 word vocabularies. They've heard just 750,000 words. So if you haven't read to your child prior to entering kindergarten doesn't mean that you failed and are at the point of no return. What this does mean is that it is critically important to start reading to your child to help improve their reading skills no matter from a newborn to 4th grade.

Tips for helping your child improve their reading confidence are: 1) Don't push your child. When reading with your

Tips for helping your child improve their reading confidence are: 1) Don't push your child. When reading with your child, don't force him to read. Instead make sure that you are next to each other and he/she is following along with you as you read. 2) Give him/her privacy. Give them time alone to read without an audience. 3) Read to a different audience. Suggest that he/she read to a puppy, younger sibling, or stuffed animal. 4) Let your child see you struggle with words...sometimes we have to work hard on a word or two! 5) Don't overcorrect. When your child is reading, do not correct him/her too much. Remember, the goal here is to build confidence. The commitment you make now

to your child will have a lifelong effect, please take time to read to your child.

 All middle school students are able to participate in service activities sponsored by the Middle School Kindness Club and Student Council. These groups spread joy to the rest of the middle school by sending positive messages and organizing middle school activities

The Fall Fling sponsored by the middle school student council was a huge success, with over 75% of the middle

school students attending to dance, play video games, and have an open gym

• A response to intervention (RTI) program was introduced this school year in the middle school, where students

receive extras supports in reading and math without missing out on core classroom instruction

The entire middle school is reading a book titled "Restart", a fictional story about a student who was the school bully, but lost his memory and has a chance to make a different identity for himself. Will his classmates give him a chance to make new friends? The author of this book will be visiting our school this coming spring

This means she advanced to compete nationally. Delaney ended up receiving Bronze at the national competition. She will be recognized at the National FFA Convention for her Proficiency, along with receiving her American Degree. Great job and congratulations, Delaney, on all your hard work! The teams then went on and placed 3rd at the District 5, contest which means they advanced on to the State Contest. The state team consisted of Chryseis Kazee, Sawyer Flora, Kelli Cooke and Colton Vanwinkle.
