## From The Desk Of The Superintendent

As we wind down the year and enjoy the holiday season. I would like to thank the Tri-County North Community for supporting the renewal of our existing one percent earned income tax levy this past November. The funds collected from this levy support operating expenses and allow us to continue to offer the programs and experiences that we have been able to offer to our students. The original levy was passed back in 2014 and this was the second renewal for this levy. When it was originally passed, we told our community that if it passed we would hopefully not have to go back to our tax payers and ask for additional new money for at least ten years. I am proud to report that not only have we exceeded the ten year expectation, but with the passage of this renewal, we should be good for the duration of the levy and hopefully several years beyond. I know that it was a very close contest but we do, again, thank you for your support in all of the things that we try to do to make TCN a great school for our students.

I am also proud to inform you that with dollars from the Governor's Safety Grant, we have been able to complete many upgrades which will improve our facilities tremendously. We have added several LED lights to the outside of our building and our parking lots to provide a much safer environment after dark. We have also added an additional 48 security cameras, including cameras at our bus garage, in the stairwells, in our gymnasiums, and down at the athletic stadium. We now have approximately 100 cameras in and around our facilities allowing us to record events internally and externally on our school campus. We have also replaced several of our HVAC units that were very old using this grant money. Lastly, we were able to upgrade some areas that needed new fencing and we also installed power gates at the bus garage and down at the stadium. All of these improvements will make our school and facilities a much safer place.

So far it has been a mild winter and we have once again made it through the first semester without using any calamity days. As most of you know, we utilize the "One Call" notification system in the event of an emergency, a two hour delay or a school closing. We have also added "Parent Square" to help us with these important notifications. If you have not provided a phone number for our database or if you experience any other issues or problems please contact Noelle Rhoades at the District Office at 937-962-2671 and she can assist with your issue. Our goal is to try to provide you with the best communication possible when these situations occur. We will still place most information on the local TV and radio stations as well for those who have family and friends that may not be in our system.

We hope that you enjoy this newsletter and that it helps to not only inform you of upcoming events, but that it provides you with a "snapshot" of some of the wonderful things that are happening here at Tri-County North. I would like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. As always, I want to thank you for your support! ## **Elementary School News**

The elementary school will be hosting a Family Literacy Night on Thursday, March 7th from 5:30pm - 7:00pm. Our theme this year will be based around the solar eclipse scheduled for our area on April 8, 2024. Please mark your calendars to attend as we will have a meal and several fun activities for you and your child to participate in while here. We would like to share some of the reasons for the importance of literacy. Literacy is the ability to read and write. As students enter kindergarten they are on different levels of understanding letters, sounds, words, etc. Kindergarten teachers will start with students in their classrooms with as much as a five year's difference in reading levels. Some kindergarten students may be able to read and write at the second grade level, while others may not recognize but a few letters and not understand that letters have sounds. This difference in the reading levels has been made up in a large part due to the amount of reading a student has heard prior to entering school and once in school. Students who've been read to for 20 minutes a day have working vocabularies of 40,000 words before entering kindergarten. They have heard over 3 million words. Children who've barely been read to or none at all have 10,000 word vocabulary. They've heard just 750,000 words. So if you haven't read to your child prior to entering kindergarten doesn't mean that you failed and are at the point of no return. What this does mean is that it is critically important to start reading to your child to help improve their reading skills no matter from a newborn to 4<sup>th</sup> grade. Tips for helping your child improve their reading confidence are: 1) Don't push your child. When reading with your child, don't force him

to read. Instead make sure that you are next to each other and he/she is following along with you as you read. Trace your finger along the text as you read. 2) Give him/her privacy. Give them time alone to read without an audience. Respect his/her privacy to read alone. 3) Read to a different audience. Suggest that he/she read to a puppy, younger sibling, or stuffed animal. None of these judge or know if a word was read correctly or not. This helps your child build his/her confidence. A child can build so much confidence by reading to his/her baby brother or sister. Everyone wins! 4) Let your child see you struggle with words. I understand that some parents want to seem infallible, but showing your children that sometimes we have to work hard on a word or two is beneficial too. A parent struggling shows that sounding out words while reading isn't a sign of weakness but a tool to use no matter how good of a reader you are. 5) Don't overcorrect. When your child is reading, do not correct him/her too much. Remember, the goal here is to build confidence. You will have lots of time to work on accuracy and fluency, but take it one step at a time. If your child asks for help with a word, go for it, but small mistakes or omissions should be overlooked in the name of confidence for now. The commitment you make now to your child will have a lifelong effect, please take time to read to your child.

## 2024-2025 Preschool Registration Announced

Registration for the 2024-2025 Tri-County North Wee Panthers Preschool will be help February 26—March 1, 2023. Beginning February 26 (not before), go to www.tcnschools.com and then to the Student Registration tab. You will begin your registration by clicking on the blue link for FinalForms. All forms will turn GREEN once complete. After the online portion is completed in full, you will receive an email through FinalForms asking you to call and set up an appointment to bring in your child's required documentation. Incoming preschoolers will also be required to have a physical prior to the start of school. The Child Medical Statement form can be found in FinalForms on the "Preschool Registration Information" tab. Please print this off, have the physician fill it out and turn it into the District Office prior to the start of school.

Children must be 4 years old and up by August 1, 2024. More information about TCN Wee Panthers Preschool can be found on our website under 'District News' and then 'Our Schools'.

## A Note From The Nurse



The School Smiles program offers cleaning, fluoride, x-rays, crowns, sealants, restorations, and extractions. Did you know that oral health can affect your students overall health and well being? If uncontrolled, bacteria in the mouth can multiply and eventually enter the bloodstream, affecting all parts of the body, making your student feel very ill. Also, oral health issues such as cavities can impact your students ability to learn by causing a decreased appetite, depression, and inability to focus attention- all of which can lead to a risk of lower school attendance and learning performance. Studies have shown that children who have limited preventive care will miss three times as many school days due to oral health problems. Many oral health conditions are preventable with early treatment. Tri- County North is excited to provide the opportunity for students to receive oral health care right here in the comfort of their own school! The School Smiles program is scheduled to be at Tri- County North on March 11 & 12 2024. If you would like to have your child seen during this event, please contact me for more infor-

According to the American Optometric Association "Failure to address significant eye and vision conditions early may have longterm consequences not only on eye health, but also on educational attainment, professional opportunities and quality of life". Unfortunately children are not always aware that they are unable to see exactly how they are supposed to. The American Optometric Association recommends that children ages 6-17 years of age have a comprehensive eye exam done before entering 1st grade and then annually after that, unless otherwise recommended by the eye doctor. Tri- County North has partnered with the Ohio Optometric Foundation and Eye Docs of Brookville to provide Eye Exams and glasses to students who have not had an eye exam in the past 12 months, have failed their school vision screening, have recently been placed on an IEP OR are suspected of having a vision disorder by a parent/guardian or member of the school staff. The vision exams will take place on 2/29/2023 and if needed 3/7/2023. If you would like to have your child see during this event, please contact me for more information!

**Elementary Families:** Please make sure to keep an extra change of clothes in your child's backpack in case of spills or bathroom accidents. As the weather is changing please make sure that the extra clothes are weather appropriate.

Just a reminder for the current 6th grade and 11th grade families. Your student will need updated vaccinations before the beginning of next school year, so if you are visiting your family doctor between now and the beginning of the school year please ask them about what vaccinations are needed. Please turn documentation in for these vaccinations once they are received.

## How Do You Register?

- Beginning February 26th, go to the Tri-County North website at www.tcnschools.com
- 2. Click on the <u>Student Registration</u> tab and thoroughly read the instructions.
- 3. Create a Final Forms account by clicking on the blue link and then fill out and sign off on all online forms (forms will turn **GREEN** once complete).
- 4. The week of March 11th, you will receive an email from FinalForms to sign up for an <u>appointment</u> to bring in your required documentation.

  Document drop off will be the week of **March 18-22**, **2024**. At this appointment, you will also register for Kindergarten Screening, which will be held in August.
  - \* PLEASE DO NOT BEGIN YOUR REGISTRATION BEFORE February 26, 2024 \*

### **REQUIRED DOCUMENTATION:**

- Certified Birth Certificate from the Health Department
- Immunization Records
- THREE Current Proof of Residencies in Parent's/Guardian's Name (see website for acceptable proofs)
- Original Custody Paperwork from the Courts (if applicable)
- IEP/504 (if applicable)
